Dear Epiphany,

"Wherever you are on your spiritual journey, you have a place at Epiphany." I love hearing that every Sunday; Epiphany has been such a good place for me.

So what about that spiritual journey? How's it going? Or as Doyt has often said, how goes it with your soul?

I've recently announced that I'm entering the second year of my two year training program in spiritual direction. And you may have read that and wondered, "What's spiritual direction?"

Spiritual direction is an ancient practice in the church (and other religions) in which one pilgrim seeks the companionship and support of another. A spiritual director doesn't "direct" in the sense of telling the seeker what to do. Instead, they listen prayerfully to the directee and help them discern where God is present and active in their life.

Spiritual direction is not like counseling or therapy, in which the focus is on problem solving. It's also not like a coaching relationship, in which goals are established and the coach focuses on helping the person meet them. Instead, a spiritual director helps a person discern what God is up to in their life, what God is calling them to. It could be as big as a new career or as seemingly small as new prayer practice. It might be a journey of grief, or it could be a spiritual awakening. Perhaps the directee is being invited to consider their image of God and how it has shaped their self-image. Where is their spiritual journey taking them, and, ultimately, how can they know themselves as God's beloved?

While spiritual direction has been practiced through the centuries, in our time there is an expectation that people who practice this ministry will be formally trained and certified, and adhere to a code of ethics such as the one issued by Spiritual Directors International. I'm being trained in the "Listening With Spirit" program through The Priory, a community of Benedictine sisters near Olympia, and will be under their supervision.

Spiritual direction typically consists of monthly meetings of about an hour. Since I will be in training until the spring, I'll be meeting with directees at no charge during this period of time. It's important to note that, while I'll be meeting directees in my office in Christie House, I'll be doing so independent of Epiphany Parish.


THE LESSON: James 3:1-12

Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits.

How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no one can tame the tongue-- a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh.

THE GOSPEL: Mark 8:27-38

Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."





THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.



Adult Formation: Al Summit at Epiphany The Rev. Doyt Conn and The Rev. Kate Wesch

"We stand at the cusp of a new era, marked by the rapid development and integration of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in our daily lives and societal structures. As we navigate through this unprecedented technological advancement, it becomes imperative for the church to reflect on the theological, ethical, and societal implications it harbors. AI & The Church Summit aims to foster a profound dialogue in and among The Episcopal Church, Presbyterian Church (USA), and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) on the role of AI in our world and the church's involvement in shaping its trajectory."

The above quote comes from the invitation for theologians and priests to apply to be part of the AI and church summit that took place this summer at Epiphany. It was a time of significant conversation around with some claimed to be the most important topic facing humanity today. Both Doyt and Kate attended this conference and will share what they learned from their experience.
