What up with all the workshops and a class???

Dear Epiphany,

I am writing to make sure everybody in the congregation understands the cascading events that are leading up to *Relata* in the fall (Sept. 10 – Oct. 30, 2024). The two lead-up classes to Relata are the *Why Do You Go To Church* workshops, and the *Relata Beta Test (RBT)* series. These precursors to *Relata* will prepare us for making *Relata* a resounding success.

You may recall that *Relata* is a course designed to bring to life what we mean when we say: *Relationship* is *Primary*. It is a theological exercise where we gather to consider how we are connected to each other and to wonder together how God shows up in these connections. *Relata*, the word, means things in relationship, all at the same time.

The first thing I'd like to invite you to is a workshop: Why Do You Go To Church? Since we are all going to invite people to be part of *Relata*, and *Relata* will take place at Epiphany, it is very likely we will hear: "Why do you go to church?"

Even if you've been going to church your entire life, that question can stump us in the moment. So, it is best to have given some thought to your answer ahead of time. To that end, Ashley Smith and I have put together a workshop to do just that.

Here is the next workshop: March 16, 2024 9:00 - 12:00 in the Great Hall To sign up please email Diane Carlisle (*verger@epiphanyseattle.org*).

Now, it is important to note that these workshops are different from the *Relata Beta Test (RBT)*. *RBT* is an 8-week class for the Epiphany congregation to have the *Relata* experience by engaging with the curriculum. This firsthand knowledge of *Relata* will make inviting people to it so much easier. *RBT* is on Sundays at 10:00 am from April 28 – June 16, 2024. As we come up out of COVID, and step back actively into community, it's time to invite people to this sacred space we call Epiphany. We live here as community, we grow up and grow old together, and along the way we walk a spiritual journey side by side, providentially in relationship with each other. It is a good, healthy, and important part of what it means to be human, and it is completely worthy to invite somebody to be part of it. That is our focus and invitation this coming year, and I hope you will actively step into it by participating in a workshop, *RBT*, and then, of course *Relata* itself.



CHILDREN'S SERMON

All who would like to hear the children's sermon, please proceed to the Chapel. You will return to the church at the Peace for the celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

THE LESSON: Romans 4:13-25

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") —in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

THE NICENE CREED





Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.


All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.




