Dear Epiphany,

Over the last month, we have said this prayer together each week:

*For Clara, Gracie, Fisher, Madeline, Mathias, Miles, and Vivi
who are preparing for their First Informed Communion,
let us pray to the Lord.*

And, now, today is the day of their actual First Informed Communion! But, let's back up a second, because you may have wondered, what is First Informed Communion??

As you may know, in the Episcopal Church, Baptism and Confirmation are the two major rites of passage offered to children and youth. Other traditions include a first communion experience as well. Of course as Episcopalians we have an open table, and children may receive communion at any age. But now is the time fourth and fifth graders are typically beginning to wonder in the back of their minds "What does it really mean"? What are all those things they do up there to prepare the table for us?"

They are at a point in their development where we see that they are engaging in conversations in a way that is different from when they are younger, and they can spend time in reflection that is unique to this stage of their lives. We honor that developmental stage here at Epiphany with a First Informed Communion- a rite of passage which reflects their developmental stage and helps them take communion with greater understanding and meaning.

Since before Easter, Lara Haberman and I have been walking with these seven 4th and 5th graders as they have been studying the Eucharist carefully and engaging in remarkably thoughtful conversations about what it all means. (And we've also managed to play some too!) We've had visits from the Altar Guild, from our Deacon, Lisa, and from Doyt. We spent most of the day yesterday on a spiritual retreat, thinking together about the parable of the True Vine (where Jesus asks us to abide with him) and learning more about the Book of Common Prayer. They led their families in an Evening Prayer service.

They have each chosen to take this step. And now, today, as they have decided to embrace the Holy Eucharist, we embrace them as a community in a rite of passage which honors their effort.

It has been a true privilege and a joy to teach and walk with these children. I'm so proud of how seriously they have each engaged in this important step on their spiritual journey!

THE LESSON: 2 Corinthians 4:5-12

We do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake. For it is the God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

THE GOSPEL: Mark 2:23-3:6

Gospeler The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

One sabbath Jesus and his disciples were going through the grainfields; and as they made their way his disciples began to pluck heads of grain. The Pharisees said to Jesus, "Look, why are they doing what is not lawful on the sabbath?" And he said to them, "Have you never read what David did when he and his companions were hungry and in need of food? He entered the house of God, when Abiathar was high priest, and ate the bread of the Presence, which it is not lawful for any but the priests to eat, and he gave some to his companions." Then Jesus said to them, "The sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the sabbath; so the Son of Man is lord even of the sabbath."

Again he entered the synagogue, and a man was there who had a withered hand. They watched Jesus to see whether he would cure him on the sabbath, so that they might accuse him. And he said to the man who had the withered hand, "Come forward." Then he said to them, "Is it lawful to do good or to do harm on the sabbath, to save life or to kill?" But they were silent. Jesus looked around at them with anger; he was grieved at their hardness of heart and said to the man, "Stretch out your hand." He stretched it out, and his hand was restored. The Pharisees went out and immediately conspired with the Herodians against Jesus, how to destroy him.

THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

And so, this class is not just about becoming familiar with the Bible, it is about unpacking it and pulling it apart, and seeking out links and allusions and associations between different parts of the Bible. This Bible study is a journey into words and meaning and characters, and the context behind them. We do not rush things in this class, and furthermore, because of the slow pace and our theological orientation, you can drop in and quickly find your way, even if you haven't been attending the class. Come be part of this biblical quest of Christian meaning, understanding, and relevance with the Rev. Doyt Conn. All are welcome. 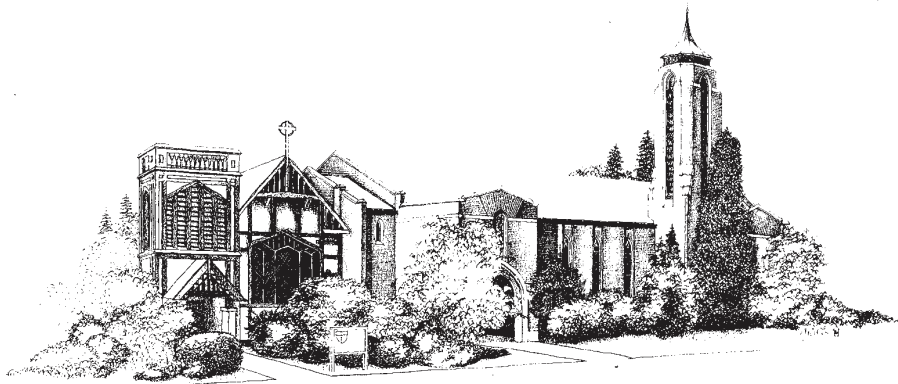
