

### THE THIRD SUNDAY AFTER THE EPIPHANY

HOLY EUCHARIST JANUARY 21, 2024 AT 11:00 AM

### Dear Epiphany,

"Thank God. Welcome home." That's what Doyt replied when I texted to tell him that I was back on solid Seattle ground. I know that many of you were praying for me while I was in Lebanon, and I am eternally grateful to be back, safe and sound, with you all. I don't take lightly the great privilege of being part of a loving and considerate community that allowed me to have time off to be with my family after five years of celebrating Christmas in absentia; my thanks go out especially to Bryan for taking on a good heap of my tasks in such a busy season at Epiphany.

But home is such a funny word for all of us with a foot in two worlds; being back in Lebanon only added to that churn of emotions. The first thing I noticed in Lebanese airspace was how much darker the nights are now; the economic crisis in the country has translated into sparser street lighting, including traffic lights. It was an eerie feeling. It didn't feel like the home I remembered.

The economic crisis was viscerally palpable with every thick wad of cash I handled that amounted to little more than \$5. I also felt it at St Luke's Rehabilitation Center, one of Epiphany's outreach partners in Lebanon through our relationship with AFEDJ. This year's Christmas celebration there was much smaller than in previous years, as one of the managers shared with me: "We usually organize a holiday market, but our families are experiencing much more economic hardship, so this year, we don't have goods to sell—who will buy them?"

And yet, the show did go on, just as it did across the country. The students of St Luke's put on a moving recital of Christmas carols that brought tears to my mother's eyes because of its spirit-filled authenticity. I felt that same spirit at my old parish, All Saints, Beirut, where I worshiped on the last morning of the year; stepping into that tiny church with its comforting acoustic and familiar scent really did feel like the home I knew.

Being there reminded me of the days when All Saints was my safe haven during the long and anxious process of immigrating to the U.S. It reminded me of how my Sundays were a highlight during stressful times, dappling the darkness with an insightful sermon one week and a touching hymn the next. It also reminded me that it was always God's will for my life that I stand with a foot in two worlds.

On this visit, I was asked if I would like to read the Epistle and I uncharacteristically said "yes." When I stood up and saw that there was no bulletin at the lectern as I'd expected, only an open Bible, my liturgical instincts from all those Sundays at Epiphany kicked in, and I didn't skip a beat. And as I walked back to my pew, I realized the other funny thing about "home" —it's more than a place. It's the collection of habits we carry with us; to inhabit a place is to become at home in its rhythms. So yes, I am home. It's good to be back. Thanks be to God.





In simple trust like theirs who heard Beside the Syrian sea The gracious calling of the Lord, Let us, like them, without a word Rise up and follow Thee.




### **EUCHARISTIC PRAYER II**





### THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider

The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.



He is now a part of the crew undertaking to read the Bible in a Year. Taking to heart Doyt's injunction to pray the Hour by Hour services, he belongs to the Marco Polo group that reads daily lessons. He grew up in a non liturgical church - Presbyterian - but was drawn to the Episcopalian service at St. John the Divine during graduate school. At Epiphany John has come to an appreciation of the richness of the liturgy and how it connects us with our souls. Epiphany has become his spiritual home. He would be greatly honored to serve Epiphany as a member of the Vestry.



George Brumder was born and raised in Pasadena, California. After graduating from college in the Pacific Northwest, he lived in Boston, San Francisco, and Manhattan before settling in Seattle with his bride in 2003. Despite an inclination to continue a peripatetic lifestyle, once children came and attendant friendship groups formed, Seattle was quickly deemed the perfect place to raise a family -- George and his wife, Jean, have two children: George (19) and Greta (16). Growing up, George attended All Saints Church (of Pasadena, not Beverly Hills) and was a junior acolyte for a number of years. Since then, Barbara has taken almost every class on offer and taught a few—on Mysticism, Thomas Merton, George Herbert, St. Paul, Noah, Climate Change. The day job peeks through on occasion. She's taught Sunday School, delivered a homily,

constructed Taize altars, lectored, ladled soup, polished brass, and helped design, write, and produce a new website. *There's that job again*. She is deeply grateful for the beauty of Epiphany's interior spaces, its gardens, its music. For friendships that endure. For being called to account. Too, for the intelligence of its sermons, the reliable surprises in its weekly liturgy, the chiropractic mental adjustment afforded her each week as she gathers with two or more of you and helps constitute the body of Christ. She is placing her bets on Doyt's belief that the neighborhood church is the hope of the world, because she has experienced the hope and joy that comes from deep connection over time and sustained personal change for the better. At present, Barbara is a regular attendee of the Rector's Bible Study, Evensong, and the 11:00 a.m. Sunday Eucharist. 
