The Fourth Sunday in Lent

HOLY EUCHARIST MARCH 10, 2024 AT 8:45 AM Dear Epiphany,

As you enter the church today, you'll notice that clergy vestments and sanctuary appointments are suddenly pink instead of the purple that we've seen since Ash Wednesday. If you wonder whether the Epiphany has become an unexpected portal to Barbieland, rest assured: The rose color reminds us that today, the Fourth Sunday in Lent, is *Laetare* Sunday, also known as "Rose Sunday," "Mothering Sunday," and "Refreshment Sunday."

Just over halfway through the penitential season of Lent, the Church observes this day with joy. Rose—a lighter shade of the more somber liturgical color purple—radiates joy. *Laetare* is Latin for "rejoice." The name comes from the Introit traditionally chanted at the liturgy, *Laetare Jerusalem*, that is, *Rejoice O Jerusalem*. If you join us for the 11:00 service, you'll hear the exquisite voices of our choir chanting these moving words from Isaiah 66:10-11:

Rejoice with Jerusalem and be glad for her, all you who love her. Sing out in exultation, all you who mourn for her. I was glad when they said to me: let us go to the house of the Lord.

You might ask, "Why do we observe a day of joy in the middle of Lent?" As Easter approaches, the Church expresses joy in anticipation of the Resurrection of our Lord, God's victory over death. Today's Gospel points to our reason to rejoice: God's deep love for each one of us is revealed in Christ Jesus, God's only Son, who reconciles us with God and one another.

On *Laetare* Sunday Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving may be relaxed as well, as we savor a taste of the joy that is to come on Easter day, which is why some traditions refer to it as "Refreshment Sunday." And, especially in the UK, it is also known as "Mothering Sunday," because during the Middle Ages domestic servants were given the day off to visit their "mother church," the church where they were baptized. Since then, its context has evolved to include worshiping at one's parish church or the nearest cathedral, usually with their own mothers and family.

As you enter through the doors of Epiphany this morning—the portal to the sacred space we call our spiritual home, I pray that your being fed by Word and Sacrament offers you a taste of the deepest joy that is to come in just three weeks. And, as we continue our Lenten journey together toward Holy Week and the *Triduum*, I pray that you continue to be transformed by God's everlasting love.

Sermon Notes

The people stand to say **THE NICENE CREED**

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.



For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."



THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.




