Dear Epiphany,

Thank you.

As I sit down to write this letter, I am filled with gratitude and a touch of sadness as I prepare to step into a new chapter in my life. I want to express my deep appreciation for my time at Epiphany.

I started at Epiphany in 2021 as a seminary intern. As a seminary intern, I managed our online presence and plugged in wherever I could. Last year, after I graduated seminary, I transitioned to Associate Rector where I have been responsible for children, youth, and families, adult education, preaching, and a host of other things. While at Epiphany I transformed from a seminary student to deacon to priest. I am so thankful that I was able to do that here. I am also very thankful for working through the Bible in a Year with you all. Those in the Thursday Bible study have been a real gift to me. There were times in some of that Old Testament reading that I wasn't sure we were going to make it. Thank goodness for those Saint John's Bible illuminations.

I am so thankful for your kids and the youth of this congregation. First Informed Communion and Confirmation were highlights for sure. The kids and youth in both FIC and Confirmation were deeply engaged and asked so many questions. Participating in these two events was deeply meaningful for me. Last Sunday in Sunday School, we listed all of the things that we did over the year. I couldn't believe the list. We did so many crafts and told so many stories. We analyzed the Super Bowl commercial, we talked about how to read the Bible, we engaged in some Godly play...and there were puppets and pinatas. There was joy. Your kids filled me with joy. The youth were always willing to volunteer and help out. They were competitive at games (and killed me at every game from cards to Mario Kart) and were always ready to eat a lot of pizza. I think we have finally found all of the Easter eggs from our flashlight Easter egg hunt.

Doyt has been more than just a colleague; he has been a mentor and a friend. He is a generous teacher. He was always available to discuss anything from theology to caffeination strategies. I am pretty sure I will never have the opportunity again to go so in depth with someone on AI, Lazarus, or the ontological nature of being human. These conversations will be missed.

Your openness to new ideas and your readiness to say "yes" to new initiatives made serving here so much fun. There is a real entrepreneurship at Epiphany that adds a vibrancy to the congregation. There is a willingness to try something new and see how it goes. I look forward to seeing how Epiphany continues to be a leader in the greater Church with your spirit of innovation and vitality. You have been gifted with many riches and have the opportunity to be a real beacon for the rest of the Church. I can't wait to see it.

Tomorrow, I will start a new job as the Interim Vicar of St. Clare's in Snoqualmie. Many of you know that I live in Snoqualmie, and this is my home parish. I will serve there until my youngest daughter goes to college. In the Fall of 2025, we will move to Oklahoma. I am looking forward to the opportunity of leading this church. I will take the lessons that I have learned here at Epiphany and try to put them to good use.





GospelerThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.AllGlory be to thee, O Lord.

Jesus said, "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."

He also said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.




BREAKING OF THE BREAD

THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.


