

THE FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER THE EPIPHANY HOLY EUCHARIST

FEBRUARY 4, 2024 AT 11:00 AM

Dear Epiphany,

Have a Heart is upon us at last. You might have just heard about Have a Heart, have never attended this event, or haven't a clue what we're talking about, even if you've been at Epiphany for a while. Have a Heart raises money to care for Epiphany's neighbors, whether they live across the street or across an ocean. Have you seen the cards about Have a Heart in the pews? They can tell you more. We hope you can attend.

Here's what to expect this evening. At 5:30 PM in the Church, you'll view a short video of Epiphany's care for people in some of the most troubled parts of the world: Gaza. Haiti. Ukraine. Guatemala. Afterward, the Epiphany Choir will sing the solemn and beautiful service of Choral Evensong. We then invite you to the Great Hall for sumptuous food, complimentary beer and wine, and a convivial, happy space to be with friends. And we will ask you for money.

Money is a powerful force in a world in which our souls, mysteriously entangled in human bodies, must live and move and have our material being. Souls need those bodies and all their attendant ills and failings. How could we travel through this human experience without our mortal baggage?

Think of some of the most memorable miracles of Jesus. Healing the woman with the hemorrhage. The twelve lepers. The lame man lowered through the roof. The raising of Lazarus and Jairus' little daughter. Multiplying the loaves and fishes. Jesus preached and taught for the mind and spirit, but he did not hesitate to alleviate the suffering of a human body. (And since we're on Have a Heart, I should mention the wine he provided for that wedding party in Cana.)

Money can do things we can't do, go magically wired to places we can't go. It can purchase food and clean water and medical supplies. Provide warm clothing and shelter to refugees. Pay the salaries of teachers, doctors, nurses. Money gets things done that need doing.

But money does good things only if directed with love. You might have used this expression before: *Not for love nor money*. At Have a Heart, we ask you to do something with love and money. Let the powerful force of love direct the powerful force of money. Let your heart lead you to give to meet the human, material needs of people who can give you nothing materially in return, only their gratitude. Please come to Have a Heart. Invite your friends. Please give to Have a Heart.

People often ask if we set a fundraising target for this event. Our answer is never in dollars. Our goal is 100% parish participation. Under half (47%) of Epiphany households who made an annual pledge in 2023 gave to any outreach funding this past year. The number who gave specifically at Have a Heart is even less (34%). What you give is not our concern, only that you give. Giving signals your heart's desire to care for those who need our care. We hope your heart can be with us this evening.

A generous family will match gifts of first-time Have a Heart donors, up to \$10,000!

THE LESSON: Isaiah 40:21-31

Have you not known? Have you not heard? Has it not been told you from the beginning? Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth? It is he who sits above the circle of the earth, and its inhabitants are like grasshoppers; who stretches out the heavens like a curtain, and spreads them like a tent to live in; who brings princes to naught, and makes the rulers of the earth as nothing. Scarcely are they planted, scarcely sown, scarcely has their stem taken root in the earth, when he blows upon them, and they wither, and the tempest carries them off like stubble. To whom then will you compare me, or who is my equal? says the Holy One.

Lift up your eyes on high and see: Who created these? He who brings out their host and numbers them, calling them all by name; because he is great in strength, mighty in power not one is missing. OFFERTORY SENTENCE

The offertory is the time during the service when we give offerings to God, acknowledging that all we have comes from God. The choir offers their gift of music, and this is our opportunity to offer thanks to God through a monetary gift to support the ministries of Epiphany. Active Epiphany parishioners make an annual pledge commitment toward the vitality of our ministries. In some cases pledging parishioners also make a financial contribution at the offertory. Money placed in the hunger basket at Communion supports our outreach ministry of feeding those in need. You may use the QR code, either during the anthem or later at your convenience, or place your offering in the offering plate as it is passed.





EUCHARISTIC PRAYER II



It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, O Lord, holy, almighty, everlasting God, because in the mystery of the Word made flesh, thou hast caused a new light to shine in our hearts, to give the knowledge of thy glory in the face of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. All glory be to thee, O Lord our God, for that thou didst create heaven and earth, and didst make us in thine own image; and, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to take our nature upon him, and to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption. 




BREAKING OF THE BREAD

THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider

The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.
