## The Last Sunday After the Epiphany

HOLY EUCHARIST February 11, 2024 at 8:45 am Dear Epiphany,

What does God look like?

Did you first imagine a '60s movie style image of a God who looking a bit like Gandalf with a long white beard, on a throne in a cloud, looking quite stern? Many of us were raised to imagine God this way, but I invite you to take a minute to ponder your actual theology around this.

#### What is an image of God that truly matches your theology?

This turns out to be a very important question, because your image of God can affect how you experience God. And it certainly can make the process of discerning where God is leading you easier or more difficult. If the God you imagine sternly looks down upon you from upon high, then your foundational or perhaps subliminal perspective could be that God is harshly judging (and therefore you must first make up for your deficits or focus on atonement before you can clearly hear God's call). That leads you to a very different place than if you begin with an image of a God who loves you and has created you to be the best YOU possible (and therefore you can start from where you are, free to try things, knowing God will love you however it turns out). If we believe (even subliminally) that God is judging or harsh, it can be tough to live fully into the idea that God truly, deeply, abundantly loves us.

We're about to embark on the season of Lent when we'll shine light into our darker corners. Doing this with a frame that begins with God loving us deeply and profoundly will help us see much more clearly what we are called to do differently. Frankly, it's also easier to release any shame and turn back to a loving entity that we know will forgive us.

Bottom line, every single one of us (no exceptions) actually is very deeply loved. God is NOT joining our critical voice regarding all the things that are wrong with us. In fact, that critical voice (that pretty much every human being has rattling around in their heads) is most commonly a "not-God" voice.

In this upcoming season of Lent, I encourage you to put yourself in the way of our loving God. Maybe try the very juicy experience of silence, where the chatter in our minds can fade away and the presence of God can become quite palpable. Maybe try fasting, where you remember that you love God more than that chocolate bar. Maybe try tithing 10%, where you remember that everything you have comes from God anyway and that you can in fact trust God to care for your material needs.

Whatever you try this Lent, embrace it with a perspective that you are safe, you are loved and God wants you to be the best you that there is.

#### THE GOSPEL: Mark 9:2-9





#### THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

*Presider* The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.


