

Dear Epiphany,

Happy New Year. The Christmas season is over,, and we are now into January looking forward to a full 2024.

It is another bulletin letter for me so it must be time for me to talk about the *Year of the Bible*. Yes, we are still going. We started the read the *Bible in a Year* program earlier in the fall. We have made it through the Pentateuch (the first 5 books). We have made it through the History books (Joshua, Judges, Kings) and now we are in the prophets.

Some people have not missed a day of the reading. Others miss a week and then cram to catch up with the reading plan. I have always recommended that if you miss a day to just skip it and start back where we are. There are many approaches to keeping up with the plan. There are probably as many approaches as there are people participating in the program. But, the key is to participate.

There are two Bible studies each week to talk about what we are reading. Kate Wesch and I lead one Bible study on Thursday by zoom. Doyt leads the other on Friday mornings. Our weekly gatherings have been a great way to share our wonderings, frustrations, and interests with each other. In the Thursday study, we have spent a lot of time looking at the illuminations of *The Saint John's Bible*. It is incredible how the message of the Bible is captured and amplified by the use of color, symbol, and stroke. Hearing how we each see these images and how the images are informed by the reading and inform our understanding is really inspiring.

So, what if you are not participating in the *Year of the Bible*? It is not too late. Do join us. It is really worth it. There are so many ways to participate that it can be done by anyone and everyone. Some people choose to read each day. Others read once a week. I listen to the audio while I drive. There are some people who know they can't commit to the daily readings so they just watch the Bible project overview for each book. Each of these ways work. If you can make one of the Bible studies, it is a great way to stay in the conversation.

You might wonder why we think this is important. We are doing some very exciting things in the next several years. Reading through the Bible together gives us a collective grounding and biblical literacy that will be important as we expand our notion of how God is working in the world and in our lives.

It is not too late. If you want to join the *Bible in a Year* program, email me at *lisa@epiphanyseattle.*org. I can put you on the list to receive the weekly email with the readings. If you want to "catch up," we can show you some videos to watch so you get an overview of each book and can be caught up in about an hour. I look forward to the future and am thankful for the conversations that we are having as part of the *Bible in a Year* program.



They answered, "Into John's baptism." Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus." On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied— altogether there were about twelve of them.

#### THE GOSPEL: Mark 1:4-11

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. 

There were Three Persons and one Lord, the Son baptised with one accord, the Father said this blessed word: Hic est filius meus, ipsum intende.


Now, Jesu, as thou art both God and man, and were baptised in from Jordan, at our last end, we pray thee, say then: Hic est filius meus, ipsum intende.

The people remain standing.


#### **EUCHARISTIC PRAYER II**



#### The Presider continues

It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, O Lord, holy, almighty, everlasting God, because in the mystery of the Word made flesh, thou hast caused a new light to shine in our hearts, to give the knowledge of thy glory in the face of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Therefore with Angels and Archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we laud and magnify thy glorious Name; evermore praising thee, and singing:

All glory be to thee, O Lord our God, for that thou didst create heaven and earth, and didst make us in thine own image; and, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to take our nature upon him, and to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption. He made there a full and perfect sacrifice for the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took bread; and when he had given thanks to thee, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."



#### THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.



While Sue and John have traveled overseas extensively, They especially enjoy the water and mountains of the Pacific Northwest - hiking, camping, skiing and sailing.

She's taught Sunday School, delivered a homily,

She is deeply grateful for the beauty of Epiphany's interior spaces, its gardens, its music. For friendships that endure. For being called to account.
