

#### Dear Epiphany,

The first time I celebrated Maundy Thursday was here at Epiphany in 2020. It was during our COVID days and the incomparable staff was putting together a video showing parishioners participating in the sacred act of foot washing. Vivian, my then-9-year-old daughter, and I agreed to record one another. I went first. I washed Vivi's feet, but did it awkwardly, haltingly. She wasn't a baby anymore, I realized, when I would frequently and smoothly and expertly bathe her chubby feet, kissing them and tickling them and laughing along the way.

Oh, the way she washed mine. With care, with softness and gentleness...with patience, and with a natural skill like she'd done it a hundred times before. I asked her if she had ever washed anyone's feet before. "No, but I liked doing it just now." Then she walked away.

Maundy Thursday is about more than foot washing. And yet that sacred ritual says it all. Pope Francis, on several Holy Thursdays, washed the feet of 12 people who were in prison in Italy. (It is said the Pope had leg and knee pain himself as he did this). The woman, maybe Mary Magdalene, washed Jesus' feet with her tears and dried them with her hair, rubbing them with perfume. Jesus washes his disciples' feet, telling them "For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you." [Jn 13:15]

Foot washing is about serving. It's about care. Showing care for the bodies God gave us. Serving one another in unexpected, intimate ways that don't serve the self but SOLEly serve the other.

This Holy Hospitality anticipates the new commandment that Jesus gave his disciples: "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." [Jn13:34] The ritual is simple and spare and bare and beautiful. It is personal. It is cleansing. It is worship. It is humility. It is an act of acceptance. Maybe even radical acceptance.

Acceptance that no matter what you have done, no matter where you have walked, no matter what your background or experience or "level" in life, we are invited to proclaim and to do this: I will wash you. I will receive you. I will show care for the body that God gave you. With this, and with the breaking of bread in the Upper Room during the Last Supper, Jesus sets the table for the first communion, thus sealing our identity as a Eucharistic community. With quiet and with reverence we receive him.





**The Gospel**John 13:1-17, 31b-35

Gospeler The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them."

Jesus said, "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

# THE FOOT-WASHING

#### The Bidding

Fellow servants of our Lord Jesus Christ: On the night before his death, Jesus set an example for his disciples by washing their feet, an act of humble service. He taught that strength and growth in the Kingdom of God come not by power, authority, or even miracle, but by such lowly service. We all need to remember his example.

Therefore, I invite you who share in the royal priesthood of Christ, to come forward, that we may recall whose servants we are by following the example of our Master. But come remembering his admonition that what will be done for you is also to be done by you to others, for "a servant is not greater than his master, nor is one who is sent greater than the one who sent him. If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them."

Members of the congregation are invited to come forward to participate in having their feet washed.

During the foot-washing the congregation is invited to meditate on
the significance of the servant ministry we all share in Christ.

#### **Offertory Sentence**

Presider Jesus said, "Earnestly have I desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer."



The offertory is the time during the service when we give offerings to God, acknowledging that all we have comes from God. The choir offers their gift of music, and this is our opportunity to offer thanks to God through a monetary gift to support the ministries of Epiphany. Active Epiphany parishioners make an annual pledge commitment toward the vitality of our ministries. In some cases pledging parishioners also make a financial contribution at the offertory. Money placed in the hunger basket at Communion supports our outreach ministry of feeding those in need. You may use the QR code, either during the anthem or later at your convenience, or place your offering in the offering plate as it is passed.



Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

#### Presider and people

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him.

Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.



#### The Invitation to Communion

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Glutenfree wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.


