

THE SPONTANEOUS JOY OF CHRISTMAS

Dear Epiphany,

Merry Christmas. It is my hope that your Christmas is filled with joy. Joy is an idea I think about a lot. It sits on the thin line of freedom, diminishing under obligation, thriving under spontaneity. When life feels like a series of "to do's," joy can be a missing link in our day. When we live spontaneously as our authentic selves, joy spills all over the place lubricating the machinations, rhythms, and routines of life.

Now, it is common to think of freedom as independent choice between alternatives, where more choices equal more freedom resulting in more joy. That is why full department store shelves and innumerable Internet options are supposed to bring joy during the holiday season. Yet, in reality, there is a synaptic disconnection between choice and freedom. If freedom were as easy as choosing, then our greatest moral aspiration would be to be a person who always pulls the "good" lever. Too often Christianity is thought of as a place to learn which lever to pull.

But that is not why Jesus was born. It is not about rules, right or wrong. Christianity is about joy. Beginning with the joy of the birth of a child. Followed by the joy of God saying at the baptism of Jesus, "This is my Son with whom I am well pleased." Jesus spends much of his public life in celebration with people he meets along the way. His first miracle in the Gospel of John is to replenish the wine at a wedding party. (That is a Savior I can follow.) Even the resurrection is a celebration of God's victory over death. Talk about joy.

God came to us in a way we can understand so we can know how to share in the freedom God hopes for us. Joy is the fruit of this freedom, and was, in fact, the message that caused Christianity to spread like wildfire. Christians were known to be more joyful than other people, not because they wore a "fixed smile of a pre-booked place in paradise," but because they were radiant. Jesus is God's smile made real, and Christians are people who smile back at Jesus. If that were not God's intent, God would have come into the world as an order, not an invitation; as a conquering warrior, not a defenseless child.

What does joyful spontaneity have to do with morality and freedom and choice? Everything! The morality of navigating good and bad choices is the morality of children. The morality of joy is becoming adults who spontaneously choose good because that is their habit, their way of life. They do so like a boy who catches a ball when it is thrown to him. It is a skill developed down at the core of his being that springs forth when the ball is thrown. There is joy in making the catch, each and every time.

That is the freedom of moral spontaneity shed upon us at Christmas: God freely, spontaneously appearing in our midst to share the blessing of divine, eternal joy. It is in God's joy, given through the birth of a child, that we are freed to be joyful. May this grace-filled gift be a blessing upon you this Christmas!



The Invitation to Communion

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

Sundays

8:45 am Holy Eucharist

A service of Holy Eucharist in the church using modern language (Rite II) from the Book of Common Prayer. Anthems are sung by our Epiphany Choir with hymns sung by the choir and congregation.

11:00 am Holy Eucharist

A service of Holy Eucharist in the church using traditional language (Rite I) from the Book of Common Prayer. This service uses incense and Sanctus Bells to engage all of your senses in worship. Parts of the Eucharist are chanted. Anthems and hymns are sung by the choir and congregation.

5:30 pm Evensong

Sung at the close of day in cathedrals and churches throughout the world, Choral Evensong is a service of Evening Prayer, derived from the ancient offices of Vespers and Compline. The choir sings the traditional evening prayers of the church that have been offered for centuries, while the congregation listens, joins in the hymns, and adds their own prayers to those of the choir. Feast of the Epiphany

Saturday | January 6 | 7:30 pm | Church

Every year, 12 days after Christmas, the Epiphany Family gathers for a party. We celebrate the arrival of the Wise Men with a Festive Eucharist. In the Anglican Tradition, this is the official end of Christmastide, but it also has deeper meanings, with its own short season that marks the Baptism of Our Lord and the Wedding of Cana.

Why these events? How are the connected to Christmas? The answer lies in the meaning of the word "epiphany" – it is a moment of sudden revelation or insight, and through these events, we honor the moments in the Jesus story when God made Godself known to God's people. The Feast of the Epiphany celebrates the revelation of God incarnate as Jesus Christ.

During this service, we will also be blessing chalk for you to take home to mark another great Anglican tradition: Chalking of the Doors. This is a way to celebrate and literally mark this feast with chalk on our front doors, asking for God's blessing on our lives and home.

This is our eponymous feast as a community, so we follow the Festive Eucharist with a festive party! We ask you to help us make this celebration a success by giving our hospitality team a hand. 
