

Enter into Holy Week

Dear Epiphany,

Palm Sunday service always makes me remember the Holy Land. Part of our pilgrimage there includes walking from the top of the Mount of Olives, down past the Garden of Gethsemane, through the Kidron Valley, and up the hill to the place where Jesus was crucified.

It is a well-worn, very old road. It is no exaggeration to say that millions upon millions of people have walked it. And so, the stone under foot is smooth and well worn, which means trip hazards are infrequent, but, if wet, it is treacherous. The wrong soled shoes might lead to an event resembling skiing more than walking.

As a kid I had a horse. You've heard me tell tales of Bricka. She was that stubborn half quarter-horse half donkey with a mind of her own. Whenever I walk the Palm Sunday road I think of Bricka, because Jesus rode a donkey on that day. And I wonder about the beast's sure-footedness on the slippery cobblestone. Maybe it wasn't as worn back then, though it probably was, given it was well-trodden by the Jewish pil-grims coming to Jerusalem for the festivals. I remember the times when I was riding Bricka and she would go skidding down a hill or across a patch of ice or even across a well-paved road. When that happened, I'd usually drop the reins, and grab the saddle horn (I rode western), and hang on for dear life.

It wasn't raining on Palm Sunday. Jesus certainly wasn't riding western. Maybe it was so crowded that even if his donkey did slip, it wouldn't have slid too far. But I wonder if Jesus had any sense that he was holding on for dear life. I wonder about the mass of emotion he must have had welling in him as he absorbed the adoration, knowing it was misappropriated, and would quickly flip to anger, contempt, and murder.

As we enter Holy Week, I invite you to hearken back the moments when you were hanging on for dear life. I want to invite you to connect with Jesus who was scared and anxious and disappointed; who suffered mightily, and yet never robbed anyone he met of their freedom to act beautifully or terribly.

My prayer is that you meditate on the high priest and where he fits into your life. That you meditate upon Pontius Pilate and where he fits into your life. That you meditate upon Judas and Peter and the Beloved Disciple and where they fit in to your life. That you meditate upon Mary and where she fits into your life. That you meditate upon Veronica who wipes Jesus' tears as he stumbles under the weight of his cross. Where are you in the Jesus story? How are you fully immersed in the entirety of his story? It is God's story, playing out in our lives.

It is our privilege during the Holy Week to enter the story fully and completely. If you do so, it will bless your soul.

THE GOSPEL: Matthew 21:1-11

When Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, `The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying,

"Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

"Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The people remain standing or kneel.

OFFERTORY SENTENCE

Presider Humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God, that in due time God may exalt you.



The offertory is the time during the service when we give offerings to God, acknowledging that all we have comes from God. The choir offers their gift of music, and this is our opportunity to offer thanks to God through a monetary gift to support the ministries of Epiphany. Active Epiphany parishioners make an annual pledge commitment toward the vitality of our ministries. In some cases pledging parishioners also make a financial contribution at the offertory. Money placed in the hunger basket at Communion supports our outreach ministry of feeding those in need. You may use the QR code, either during the anthem or later at your convenience, or place your offering in the offering plate as it is passed.



It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, O Lord, holy, Father almighty, everlasting God, through Jesus Christ our Lord; who for our sins was lifted high upon the cross, that he might draw the whole world to himself; who by his suffering and death became the author of eternal salvation for all who put their trust in him. 



THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.


