

Gospeler The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately." They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

"Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.







THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

Christ our Lord. Amen.



Presider I invite you to depart in silence. Holy Week has begun.


After the procession has led the way out of the church, the people may depart quietly, or may remain for quiet, contemplative prayer.

Good Friday Plunge

March 29, 9:30 am Madrona Beach

This cold water plunge is timed to coincide with Jesus' last breath on the cross. Valerie Conn, a ritual cold water plunger (every week for the past two years), will guide us through a pre-plunge meditation at Christie House to prepare us for the cold waters of Lake Washington. Then we will carpool down to Madrona Beach parking lot on Lake Washington. Most people will choose to stay in the water 3-5 minutes to feel the effects of the cold and to meditate on the conclusion of the season of Lent. Swimsuits and towels are mandatory; water socks, scuba shoes, swim cap, swim gloves, and hot drinks are optional.

Good Friday Gospel Read-Aloud

Deepen your holy week journey by joining us in the Fireside Room on Good Friday to participate in the Gospel read aloud. The Gospels originally came from an oral tradition: listening to them being read out loud from start to finish gives you a different perspective on the life and ministry of Jesus in this holiest of weeks. People will take turns reading the Gospels from The Saint John's Bible from start to finish in the Fireside Room. We will begin with the Gospel of John, then go as far as we can into the Gospel of Matthew, taking short breaks every hour. You're welcome to join us for as short or as long as you like.

Adult Formation—The Prophetic Tradition and Its Relevance to These Times | 10:00 am | Great Hall and Zoom The Rev. Lex Breckinridge

In the Bible, a prophet isn't a fortune teller or a soothsayer. A prophet doesn't have magical powers to predict the future. A prophet is simply a person who is steeped in the ways of God, who knows God intimately. The prophet looks around, reads the signs of the times, and because the ways of God are so well-known to him or her, the prophet can say with certainty, "If you—whether you be the king, the religious establishment, or the nation—continue to act in this way, you can expect that God will act accordingly." The prophet speaks truth to power. The prophets we meet in the Hebrew Scriptures lived and worked in times that were at least as perilous as our own. What insights did they have and how are these insights important for us in these "interesting times" in which we are living?

Sung at the close of day in cathedrals and churches throughout the world, Choral Evensong is a service of Evening Prayer, derived from the ancient offices of Vespers and Compline. The choir sings the traditional evening prayers of the church that have been offered for centuries, while the congregation listens, joins in the hymns, and adds their own prayers to those of the choir.
