
CONTEMPLATION & PRAYER IN THE STYLE OF TAIZÉ



Christ is the image of the invisible God, the first-born of all creation... For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him to reconcile to himself all things... making peace by the blood of his Cross. Colossians 1:15, 19-20

he worship tradition represented in this evening's service began many years ago at the ecumenical French monastic community of Taizé. It is a quiet service of meditation, reflection, readings, and music. The experience finds its true meaning in the active participation of all assembled by focusing and deepening our faith through the power of Therefore everyone is prayer. encouraged to participate as the Spirit moves them, whether that be in song, prayer, or quiet meditation. Much of our modern personal need is for entertainment. We have "busy" souls. The liturgy that has developed around the Taizé community is primarily for the worship of God, but it is also meant to quiet the soul. This quietness does not happen at once, but gradually during the worship. There is repetition in the words of the music, there are many periods of silence, and the readings are read slowly—all so that we may have a deep quiet in our hearts. Then we may be still and be at peace in the Presence of God.



When the Night Becomes Dark




Prayer for light


With the knowledge that for thousands of years the people of God have used the Psalms to express their waiting on God, all join in singing the following:

The Psalm-Psalm 70

plainsong

The first verse is sung by the Choir; all join at verse 2, beginning each verse on the 'reciting tone' (square note). We observe a distinct pause at the asterisk *.

An <u>underlined</u> <u>word</u> at the end of a phrase is sung on one note.

let those who love your salvation say for ever, / "Great is the LORD!"


But as for me, I am poor and / needy; * come to me speedi-/ly, O God.

Behold the Lamb of God




A Reading—from Basil the Great, Bishop of Caesarea (ca. 379)

The Presider adds a concluding Collect.



As a conclusion to the prayers, during the singing of the following texts, you are welcome to come forward and light a candle at the foot of the chancel steps.




