Dear Epiphany,

Can you believe that Advent is just around the corner? It feels like the Fall Picnic was only just here! There's a lot to look forward to this year, including a discussion group that will meet on the four Sundays in Advent that I'm working on with Kyler Granados. We'll get a chance to tell you more about it on November 10, during the 10:00 am forum, but for now, I wanted to share a bit about the spirit behind how and why we came up with our idea.

Why Advent? What's with the ritual of marking the Sundays before Christmas, anyway? On one level, it's a celebration: it's the time we stop counting Sundays from Pentecost and we start a new turn of the church year. It's also a time of reflection, preparation, and expectation, often paralleled with Lent in its mindfulness and sometimes even its liturgical colors. This parallel makes sense, because both of these seasons point to a pivotal event and doctrinal truth of our faith, with Advent preparing our hearts and minds to fully appreciate the meaning of the Incarnation. And that's a big deal. Thirdly, the season of Advent strikes an apocalyptic chord, asking us to keep our eyes on the horizon of the coming of Christ in power and glory. So, there's a whole spectrum of emotions packed into four short weeks.

According to 'Walk in Love: Episcopal Beliefs & Practices,' the season of Advent is also a time to contemplate shadows as we anticipate the light. This is a theme that Kyler and I noticed in the first Collect of the season, which speaks of "works of darkness" and "the armor of light." We talked about how this cycle syncs with what's happening in the physical world, as days grow shorter and light becomes more precious. Kyler noted how the shadows in this prayer are strangely active, while light is defensive; pausing at that image, I imagine dark waves crashing on an embattled citadel on a lonely shore. There's something both true and troubling about this picture, which makes the prayer itself a rich prompt for discussion.

What does the light promise? Where does that promise cast shadows? What blocks the rays from coming through? It's the richness of images like these that encouraged us to build our Advent offering around the four Sunday Collects. They are one way our tradition has developed to help us make sense of the Christian story and our place in it; they serve both liturgical and contemplative purposes, and, we hope, make for excellent discussion prompts. A collect, after all, is a condensation of collective practice and memory, so it already contains a multitude of voices.

You'll hear more about this offering and our Sunday forum soon, but I want to end with a small confession: this letter isn't primarily motivated by advertising either. The true spirit of this text is my love of the liturgical calendar, a love that this year feels almost desperate. It's the only spiritual practice that seems to actually make sense to me. In conversations around the RELATA table, I marvel at others who seem to find joy and spiritual fulfillment in the Daily Office and other more regular disciplines, and thank God for the grace of ritual cycles that seem to more naturally be my speed. Please enjoy these last Sundays after Pentecost.


THE LESSON: Job 42:1-6, 10-17

I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear but now my eye sees you; therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes."

THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.



Service Opportunity—Epiphany serves lunch at Angeline's Day Center for Women on November 7. Angeline's Day Center for Women, operated by the YWCA and located in Belltown, serves women experiencing homelessness with drop-in services which include breakfast and lunch, access to bathrooms, showers, and laundry, personal storage lockers, group activities and workshops, health care access, and

referrals to community services. Case management and overnight shelter are also offered in the Enhanced Night program, which helps participants transition into permanent housing.
