HOLY EUCHARIST FEBRUARY 23, 2025 AT 8:45 AM

Dear Epiphany,

Your presence here today matters. It matters because we are better when we pray together, encourage one another, and share in communion. For just an hour or two each week, when we come into this worship space to lift our common voices in prayer and song, we get to glimpse the Kingdom of God. That is a tangible benefit of the spiritual practice of attending worship each Sunday. When we prioritize the Sabbath as a day of praise, worship, and rest, we re-engage with our families, jobs, neighbors, and civic duties continually renewed and possibly even transformed.

The world beyond the walls of this sacred space might feel scary to some of you or to someone you know and love. I know it feels that way for me right now. Basic human rights of some of the people I hold most dear are being threatened on a daily basis. It might feel tempting to give up or run away or ignore, but that doesn't help anyone. We must stay present and alert, focusing first and foremost on our own spiritual health and wellbeing. It's like putting your oxygen mask on first before helping your seatmate.

Our Episcopal Church has a new Presiding Bishop—that is a bishop who is first among equals and has been tasked with the onerous task of leading us for the next nine years. Presiding Bishop Sean Rowe is imminently capable and boldly leading us to be the church God needs us to be at this time and in this place. From 2019-2022, I had the pleasure of working with Sean on a church wide body examining the state of our church. He is a prophetic leader with a great sense of humor and I am thrilled he is our presiding bishop.

This past week, the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church met in Maryland. In his opening remarks, Presiding Bishop Rowe had this to say: "I believe that we, as the board of The Episcopal Church, have been presented with a singular opportunity to lead through this particular time with clarity and with purpose. As the political landscape in the United States becomes even more confusing and difficult to navigate, we are being called to make decisions here in this place that are firmly rooted in the kingdom of God.

"In that kingdom, where we find our true citizenship, migrants, transgender people, the poor and vulnerable are not at the edges fearful and alone. They are not reviled and escaped. Instead, in God's kingdom, the people who have too often been pushed to the margins are at the center. They are the bearers of salvation. Their struggles reveal to us the kingdom of God."

This is my prayer; that we can find our true citizenship in the Kingdom of God and that is right here, right now. I pray that we can see the pain and fear of those whom our society is currently pushing to the margins so that we might acknowledge it and remind them (and ourselves) that they, too, sit at the center of God's love. For we are all children of God, all of us worthy of the same dignity, rights, and respect.

Daily prayer and participating in worship here at Epiphany every Sunday is my anchor right now. Praying with you nourishes my soul and God sustains me to keep going another day. No matter who you are or what your life experiences are, I hope that participating in worship here at Epiphany does good for your soul.



THE LESSON: 1 Corinthians 15:35-38, 42-50

Someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven.

What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

THE NICENE CREED

The offertory is the time during the service when we give offerings to God, acknowledging that all we have comes from God. The choir offers their gift of music, and this is our opportunity to offer thanks to God through a monetary gift to support the ministries of Epiphany. Active Epiphany parishioners make an annual pledge commitment toward the vitality of our ministries. In some cases pledging parishioners also make a financial contribution at the offertory. Money placed in the hunger basket at Communion supports our outreach ministry of feeding those in need. You may use the QR code, either during the anthem or later at your convenience, or place your offering in the offering plate as it is passed.



Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:



THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.
