Dear Epiphany,

"To be a follower of Jesus is an act of rebellion against the hopelessness of the world." Those were the words that rang out from our pulpit last Sunday. In his sermon, Doyt entreated us to not miss the moment and to tend to whatever may be before us, right here, right now, as Adam and Eve tended to the Garden of Eden. That's our ministry since those prelapsarian days, and it continues to be so in this, our new creation in Christ.

This is how Paul puts it: "If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" But this passing away and beginning anew is far from passive; the Apostle continues: "All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us."

For many of us, this means sharing that message by talking about God, just as Jesus talked about God in his debates with the religious scribes and scholars. This isn't necessarily a comfortable "ask," especially in a city like Seattle, but there is no denying that part of what it means to be a follower of Jesus is to have those conversations and to tell those stories.

At the same time, we should avoid the temptation of taking Paul's words too literally (or, perhaps, not literally enough) by reducing our ministry to waving tracts in people's faces like organs of propaganda yelling: "Extra, extra! Read all about it! Repent! Assent!" Sharing the words of God is right and proper, but we know that this surface reading can also miss the point of Christianity: that the Word of God is Jesus Christ, the word made flesh whom "we once knew...from a human point of view." In other words, Christianity isn't a meme that we 'like,' comment on, and reshare with our friends—it's a transfiguration of the very stuff of this world: atoms, quarks, blood, sweat, and tears.

Here's Paul again: "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." We are not to simply talk about the righteousness of God, or to convince people that God is righteous; we are to become God's righteousness. And how do we become God's righteousness? Jesus asks us to learn from the Good Samaritan who did not necessarily believe the right things nor even speak the right language; and yet, he met the moment, despite being the 'wrong' person at the right time, and he became a cultivator of God's garden and a minister of God's creation. That's our model. That's our how-to guide.

Over the last few months, I've been trying to move from a place of despair and paralysis brought on by the relentless flood of headlines here and abroad to a place of action and community, however faltering or hesitant. And this has taken me into spaces that are actively hostile to my faith, for good reasons and not so good reasons. This would have made me uncomfortable in the past, feeling a little bit like the weirdo at the cool kids' table, but today, with the nameless Samaritan as inspiration, it feels like the best way I can keep following Jesus, that "fellow [who] welcomes sinners and eats with them."

Jesus met the moment and so should we. That moment will look differently to each of us; for me, it means doubling-down on hope by becoming hope and insisting on belonging to a common cause in spite of disparate beliefs. To you, it may mean doubling-down on love or doubling-down on faith; whatever that moment may be for us, let's not miss it. Let's rebel against despair so that we might be made into the righteousness of God.



THE GOSPEL: Luke 10"25-37

But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.' Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

THE NICENE CREED





THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION


Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.
