Dear Epiphany,

Today, as we celebrate and give thanks for the mothers who raised us, shaped us, and in many cases now live on in memory, I invite you to lift your eyes to the mother who watches over this parish every day, the one who sits quietly in the round window above our altar.

That's Mary, of course. And while we often call it "the Mary Window," its true name is the Epiphany Window. If you look closely, you'll see that it tells the story of the Magi arriving to offer gifts to the Christ child. Mary is there holding Jesus, and around them are angels, shepherds, animals, and even Joseph. It's a complete nativity tableau, crafted with care and beauty, placed in that sacred space as a gift to Epiphany when this church building was constructed in 1951.

Today, that window needs our care. After nearly 75 years, it's time for a full restoration. It will be removed soon, cleaned, releaded, and preserved—so that future generations may continue to be drawn into its quiet beauty and sacred story.

This restoration work wasn't included in our last capital campaign over a decade ago, and so it must be done now. And it is not the only piece of our spiritual home that needs tending. As I shared at the annual meeting, we are discerning a new capital campaign that will launch sometime after the first of the year. It will focus on what we need to do, and in some cases what we want to do. Our last capital campaign in 2015 was about vision for the next hundred years, and how we design Epiphany for future vibrancy. Our 2026 capital campaign will be about continuing to care for what we have.

The Epiphany window restoration is firmly in that "need to do" category. And so we begin. In some ways, it's a quiet beginning to a larger conversation, a way of remembering that we are stewards of this place, called not only to cherish what we've inherited, but to care for it and prepare it for the future.

So, when you notice the round window missing in the weeks ahead, don't be alarmed. Our mother isn't gone, she's just out for a check-up. She'll return soon, ready to take her place once more above this holy space, blessing generations to come with her steady gaze and loving presence.

Peace upon your souls, and Happy Mother's Day.

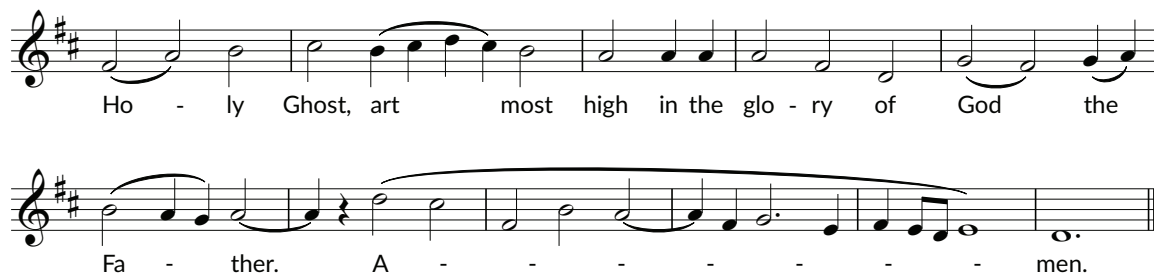

THE LESSON: Acts 9:36-43

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

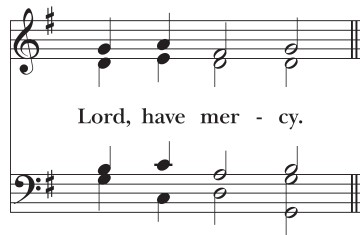



THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at one of the standing stations in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available at the altar rail. To indicate to the Eucharistic Minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

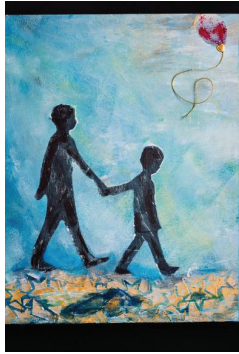

The Art of Grief is a series led by parishioner Nicola Davies J.D., PCC, beginning on Sunday, May 11 and then, running four consecutive Wednesday evenings (5/14, 5/21, 5/28, 6/4) from 6:30-8:30 pm.

Grief is a complex and deeply personal experience that often feels overwhelming and isolating. Whether you're mourning the loss of a loved one or coping with a significant life change, the journey through grief can be long and challenging. We all experience a variety of losses in life and we each walk the path of grief differently. Engaging in art and creative expression can be a powerful way to honor and process intense emotions that expand beyond words.

In this 4-week series, we'll explore ways in which hands-on creativity can assist in the coping process and offer guidance on how to incorporate it into your healing journey. Through a variety of journal prompts and simple art projects, you will experience what neuroscience has proven: creative expression has both emotional and physiological benefits.

Loss and creativity are both essential parts of the human experience. This course offers an opportunity to connect with ourselves and each other as we seek to discover ways to move forward, insights and meaning. No "skill" is necessary. The process itself is profoundly cathartic. All materials will be provided.

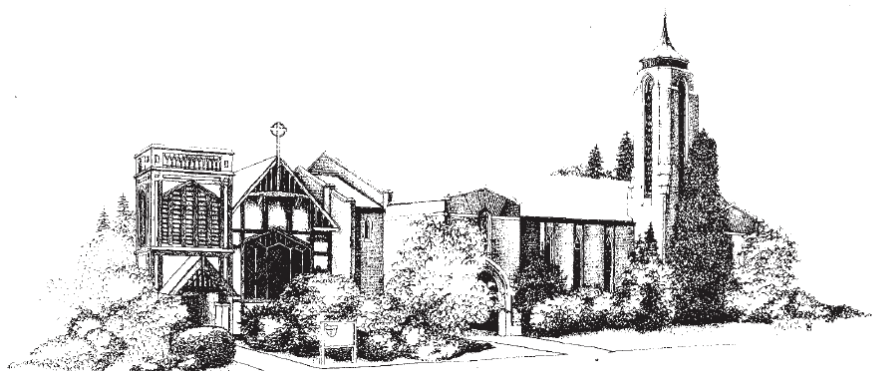
