THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

THE LESSON: *Romans 10:5-15*

Moses writes concerning the righteousness that comes from the law, that "the person who does these things will live by them." But the righteousness that comes from faith says, "Do not say in your heart, 'Who will ascend into heaven?'" (that is, to bring Christ down) "or 'Who will descend into the abyss?'" (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). But what does it say?

"The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart"

(that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

THE GOSPEL: *Matthew 14:22-33*

Gospeler The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. And early in the morning he came walking toward them on the sea. But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid."

Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him.

THE INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are invited to receive the Holy Communion. It is your choice as to whether you receive Holy Communion or a blessing. You may receive Communion or a blessing at the standing station in the front of the nave or proceed to the altar rail. The bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and then drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your lips); or, you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice bearer to dip it into the wine and place it on your tongue. Self-intinction is strongly discouraged by the Episcopal church. The people's response to receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen." Gluten-free wafers are available. To indicate to the Eucharistic minister that you would like a gluten-free wafer, please present your hands palms down. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

PILGRIMAGES TO THE UK

Epiphany Parish • Journeys of Faith Across Britain • July and August 2027



1. Rochester to Canterbury — Walking Pilgrimage

~45 miles • 8–10 miles/day • Ideal first pilgrimage & introduction to long-distance walking

Following the ancient pilgrim route through the North Downs, this journey moves at a walking pace of 8-10 miles a day, steady enough to challenge, gentle enough to welcome first-time pilgrims. Along the way, we build in intentional time inside village churches and both great cathedrals, treating each stop as a place of prayer rather than a photo opportunity (although you will be able to take photographs!). The heart of this pilgrimage is the inner journey: walking as a spiritual discipline, letting the rhythm of footsteps become a kind of moving prayer as we draw closer to Canterbury, one of Christianity's oldest and most storied destinations.



2. Winchester to Canterbury — Bus Pilgrimage

Winchester -> York -> Lincoln -> Cambridge -> Canterbury • And more! • No hiking required

Designed for those who want to go deep into our Anglican heritage without long days on foot, this pilgrimage travels by coach across England, visiting the cathedrals, churches, and holy sites that shaped the English church, from Winchester's ancient roots, north to York and Lincoln, then south through Cambridge before arriving in Canterbury. Expect time in each cathedral and church, conversation about the history and theology that formed Anglican identity, and a pace that leaves room for rest, reflection, and fellowship along the way.



3. Melrose to Holy Island — Walking Pilgrimage

~85 miles • 10–12 miles/day • Borders Abbeys Way and St Cuthbert's Way • Five abbey ruins along the route

This walk follows part of the Borders Abbeys Way and picks up St Cuthbert's Way through the quiet farmland and hills of the Scottish Borders, passing the evocative ruins of five medieval abbeys along the route. The pace is unhurried, built for silence, prayer, and noticing, culminating in the crossing of the historic Pilgrims' Way, the tidal causeway path across the sands to Lindisfarne (Holy Island), timed carefully with the tides. It ends where Celtic Christianity took deep root in Britain, on the same shores St Cuthbert once walked. Walkers need to be in good physical shape.

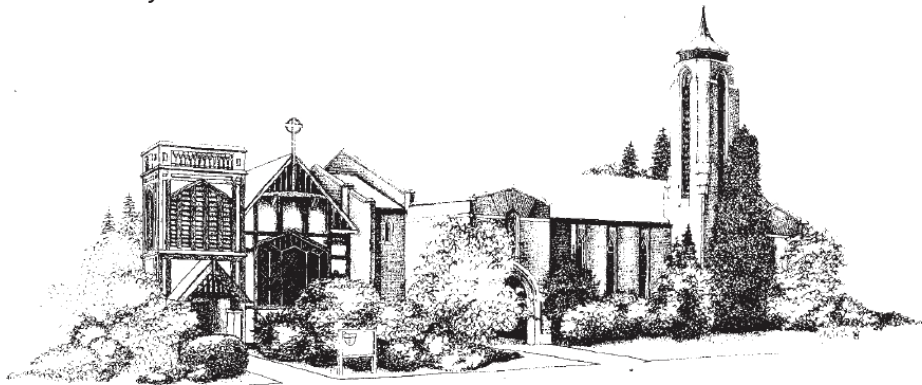
